And I declare that the receipts in writing of any trustee or trustee for the time being of this my will for any money which shall be payable to such trustee or trustee by virtue thereof shall exonerate the person or persons paying the same from all responsibility with regard to the application thereof. I give and bequeath the following legacies viz. To all my servants who shall be living with me at the time of my death one years wages I appoint the said Edmund Anthonis Count's Trotter and

Executors of this my will. And I revoke all other wills and testamentary dispositions whatsoever and declare this only to be my last will and testament.
